Advent: The season of waiting for the promised arrival of the Messiah.

Along with Easter, Advent is an especially good time to observe and reflect on God's purposes – both with us and for us. It is a good time to take a close look at our current connection, or disconnection, with God. Where does the beginning of this Advent find you: Enjoying a vital and genuine relationship with God, or somewhere else...distant, unmoved, spiritually alone? If the first is true, rejoice and enjoy. If the second is true, what happens next?

"Oh, that You would tear open the heavens and come down – not for a quiet chat but in a way that is potent and unmistakable. Come down here in a way that changes things, me included, like nothing else possibly can. Surprise us! Have your way!" (Isa.64: 1- 3 paraphrase). Isaiah's plea is a good one in the face of disconnection in all its forms. It reflects the waiting and the longing to have God act as only God can. The bad news is that we often don't quite trust Him to actually do this, or we are pretty nervous about how awful it will be if He does. We're tempted to look for other ways to get by without Him, and life ends up feeling just like that: getting by without Him.

The good news is that it is already His good purpose to break through our isolation and fear and arrogance in unstoppable ways. Starting with the tearing open of the heavens with the birth of His son, God is intent on changing everything, especially the causes of our disconnection. Our challenge is to look for Him to do it. *"Lift up your heads, O gates, lift them up, O ancient doors, that the King of glory may come in."* (Psalm 24:7)

This Advent our invitation is to wait well, and settle for nothing less than His presence. Look for God to be Surprising, Faithful, Restoring, Inviting, and Unimaginable. A daily scripture-reading guide has been provided (in your mail boxes) as a "door opener" for this Advent. Reflect, observe and risk being expectant. His purposes are powerful and kind, both tender and unstoppable.

"For as the rain and snow come down from heaven and do not return there without watering the earth, and making it bear and sprout and furnish seed to the sower and bread to the eater,

So shall My Word be which goes forth from My mouth; it shall not return to Me empty, without accomplishing what I desire, and without succeeding in that for which I sent it." Isa.55: 10-11

Expression of Gratitude

Dear Friend of The Haven,

With the incredible scale of some of the recent calamities around the world that have impacted hundreds of thousands of people at a time, it's easy to feel overwhelmed. Surely we can't help everyone but we can manage to help one person at a time.

Each night, the Haven is home to eight families, some 30 people including 18 children. These families typically stay with us for 2 to 3 month before securing their own housing. On a typical day at the Haven, 13 families receive a week's worth of groceries from our Food Shelf. Another 29 families come in for free bread and fresh produce. 15 families find something in our Clothing Room. And a dozen currently or formerly homeless children spend a couple of hours after school in our "Homework Club". The use of our Food Shelf is up over 15% in each of the past four years. I believe this can be attributed to the fact that wages for lower income workers are not growing nearly as much as expenses for rent and, lately, gasoline and heating fuel. We expect the Food Shelf to be very busy this winter.

We would not be here without you -- and we never forget that. We are your hands and feet, meeting those who are struggling at their point of need. Your continuing support ensures we will be here for families in need -- one person at a time. Thank you for your generous contributions to our Food Shelf.

Happy Holidays! Getting up on Thanksgiving morning and walking down to the edge of the river where we usually buy our rice-porridge breakfast, I was particularly struck by how thankful I need to be for my life. Early in the morning, all the people without water in their homes go down and bathe in the river, brush their teeth and, of course, use the rest room. With minimal environmental regulations, the water is heavily polluted with not only human, but also industrial waste. Watching this scene reminded me again that it is not a trade-off. Advocating for both human and environmental health is beneficial to all. Sometimes I am overwhelmed by the massive level of poverty and environmental degradation here and wonder how we can make a difference. I remember, though, that rivers also burned in the United States not too long ago and that with education and advocacy small changes have been made. This Thanksgiving we are so grateful that a twelve-year dream of coming back to Indonesia to try and do a small part in improving the health of people and the natural environment seems to be coming to fruition. Mostly we are thankful for all of you who have each helped so much with love, support, financial help, advice, and many hard hours of work.

I will soon be off to evaluate our first site. On the 5th of December, my friend, Dr. Irene and I are leaving for 10 days to Central Kalimantan where we will evaluate another site for the hospital and environmental project. The location is not far from rain forest that is still preserved and very much

needs health care. We will take a boat up-river for 10 hours in order to get to the location. I have been advised by a friend who is an Indonesian doctor and has worked in many rural sites to pay particular attention to the possibilities for a hydroelectric system. He says that one should not rely on government-provided electricity (if there is any) as it is too unreliable for a hospital and that generators in the dry-season can be very expensive. He says to worry less about road access. That can be built, a good waterfall (or big drop for a river), can't be. So we are almost off, to talk to villages about their interest in partnering with us, feasibility of building in the area, and to look at waterfalls!

The first two weeks in January we will go to East Kalimantan. We have also been negotiating with a hospital in West Borneo that I have worked at before to see how we can best work together. So far our discussions have been very encouraging. We have also been working hard on the web site. We will launch it in January and look forward to showing it to you.

If, during this holiday season, you feel that you would like to help support our work, we would be very grateful. At the moment, we are seeking to raise money to help fund the needs assessment phase and then also begin collecting money to establish the hospital.

Health in Harmony is now incorporated and our lawyers are in the process of seeking tax-exempt status for the organization. This process takes several months, but once received will be retroactive to the date of incorporation.
