I Shall Not Want...

"I shall not want," the psalm says. Is that true? There are lots of things we go on wanting, go on lacking, whether we believe in God or not. They are not just material things like a new roof or a better paying job, but things like good health, things like happiness for our children, things like being understood and appreciated, like relief from pain, like some measure of inner peace not just for ourselves but for the people we love and for whom we pray. Believers and unbelievers alike go on wanting plenty our whole lives through. We long for what never seems to come. We pray for what never seems to be clearly given. But when the psalm says "I shall not want," maybe it is speaking the utter truth anyhow. Maybe it means that if we keep our eyes open, if we keep our hearts and lives open, we will at least never be in want of the one thing we want more than anything else. Maybe it means that whatever else is withheld, the Shepherd never withholds Himself, and He is what we want more than anything else. Frederick Buechner, from his book *Listening to Your Life*.

If I can't see Him, hear Him, or feel His touch, maybe my eyes and ears and hands are filled with the stuff of my own demands. What an amazing grace that His longing to fully shepherd me is so much more faithful and consistent than my rare unencumbered longing to have Him be my shepherd. 

This is a very difficult movie to watch, as it attempts to portray what our Lord went through on his Good Friday. The point, though, is not the horror, but the unimaginable love He showed in enduring the cross and God's punishment for sin for us - so that we would not have to. We will be sharing a simple Communion following the movie, and a time of prayer.

On Resurrection Day morning, we will again have our "cross walk," leaving the Chapel at 7:00 am. We walk in silence, and stop a few times to read the Easter story from Scripture and sing a hymn, while taking turns carrying our cross together. This continues to be a wonderful way to connect with what Jesus did for us, and to worship together. All are welcome. Following the "cross walk" we will have a potluck breakfast together at the Chapel, and our service will begin at the regular time, 9:30. There will not be a regular "Second hour" that morning.

The Sunday following Easter (April 23rd) is an Ekklesia Sunday. This would be a great time to reflect together on how the Lord has been shepherding us during the Lent/Easter season. We will also be sharing in Communion on that Sunday.

Dear Churchmouse

Dear Churchmouse,

I know that God wants me to pray every day, and so I try. But my prayer life feels dry and dutiful and unsatisfying. Maybe I just don't know how to pray right. Do you have any suggestions?

Dear Saint,

Prayer, in itself, is not an automatic good. Our prayers, whether clumsy or skilled, heretical or orthodox, verbatim from the Psalter of ad-libbed from a sinking ship, get us no merit with God. Right words and correct forms are not prerequisite to a heavenly audience. It is possible to practice prayer in such a way that it drives us deep into egotism; or bloats us into a prideful ostentation. All the same, prayers are necessary to develop in the life of faith, to mature in our humanity and to glorify God with our entire heart, mind and soul and strength.

Prayer is not a narrow use of language for special occasions; saying the right sort of words to the right kind of God. And we do not learn to pray by simply directing our language to God, instead of to parents or friends. Prayer is primal speech... it is a dialogue. Our *"being"* is involved. The *"way"* we are. We do not first learn how to do it, and then proceed; we just do it. In the doing we find out what we are doing, and then deepen and mature in it. We find that until we are in prayer, we are not teachable. It is better to pray badly than not to pray at all. A ship that is dead in the water can't be steered.

We want to be at our best before God. Prayer, we think, means presenting ourselves before God so that he will be pleased with us. But we must pray who we actually are, not whom we think we should be. We are unfinished creatures – longing, reaching, and stretching towards fulfillment. We express these desires for completion in prayer; and try, if possible, to get for ourselves credit instead of shame. *But what really matters most in prayer is not that we learn to express ourselves, but that we learn to answer God.* We speak to the God who speaks to us. Presumptuous prayer speaks to God with out first listening to Him. If we pray without listening we pray out of context.

In prayer, we do not merely speak our feelings; we speak our answers. Prayer is the language used to respond, with the potential for saying all that is in us. If we truly answer God there is nothing that we may not say to him. We become ourselves as we answer, sometimes angrily disputing with Him about how he rules the world, sometimes humbling ourselves before him in grateful trust. The answers are not always articulate; silence, sighs, groanings – these all constitute responses. The answers are not always positive: anger, skepticism, curses – these also are responses.

The Book of Psalms can train us in this conversation. By means of the Psalms we can find our voice in the dialogue. The practice of Christians in praying the Psalms is straightforward: simply pray through the Psalms, psalm by psalm, regularly. That's it; open our Bibles to the book of Psalms, and pray them – sequentially, regularly, faithfully across a lifetime. This is how most Christians for centuries have matured in prayer. Nothing fancy. Just do it. The praying itself is deliberate and leisurely, letting (as St. Benedict directed) the motion of the heart come into harmony with the movement of the lips.

The Psalms are not provided to teach us about God, but to train us in responding to Him. The Psalms train us in converting from talking *about* God to talking *to* God. They will not primarily give us ideas about God, or direction in moral conduct. We will expect, rather, to find the experience of being human before God exposed and sharpened. Left to ourselves, we will pray to some god who speaks what we like hearing, or to the part of God that we manage to understand. The Psalms, instead of being tributaries into the flow of the great prayer-river of longing for the absolute, they abruptly stand us up, our lungs half-full of water, coughing and sputtering our unrehearsed answers to the God who calls us into Life.

Here is the deeply felt, honestly voiced raw data of the human condition; brimming with human experience and explosive with energies of soul. The Psalms... don't so much as tell us something we never knew, but bring into recognition what is latent, forgotten, overlooked, suppressed.

Comprehension of the invisible begins in the visible. One way the Psalms teach us to pray is by saying 'Open your eyes'. Often our prayer pattern is: fold your hands, bow your head, shut your eyes, and we'll pray. But the Psalmists take us into the "theater of the glory of God" and calls us to look around, and see the hills, "from which comes our help;" the trees, "planted by streams;" to hear the mighty thunder, the trees "clapping their hands." They show us how to pray with our eyes open,

wide open. But God's word precedes these words: these prayers don't seek God, they respond to the God who seeks *us*.

The primary use of prayer is not for expressing ourselves, but in *becoming ourselves* with God. We prepare to pray not by offering our prayers, but ourselves. When we engage in the act of prayer itself, there is no preparing, no getting the right words, no posture to take, no mood to assume. We simply do it. At or near the center of our lives, where God and the human, faith and the absurd, love and indifference are tangled in daily traffic jams, we must... come to personal relationship, response and intimacy: "Abba! Father!"

Find 30 Books

There are thirty books of the Bible in this paragraph. Can you find them? This is a most remarkable puzzle. It was found by a gentleman in an airplane seat pocket, on a flight from Los Angeles to Honolulu, keeping him occupied for hours. He enjoyed it so much, he passed it on to some friends. One friend from Illinois worked on this while fishing from his johnboat. Another friend studied it while playing his banjo. Elaine Taylor, a columnist friend, was so intrigued by it she mentioned it in her weekly newspaper column. Another friend judges the job of solving this puzzle so involving, she brews a cup of tea to help her nerves. There will be some names that are really easy to spot. That's a fact. Some people, however, will soon find themselves in a jam, especially since the book names are not necessarily capitalized. Truthfully, from answers we get, we are forced to admit it usually takes a minister or scholar to see some of them at the worst.
