"...for His compassions never fail - they are new every morning: great is Your faithfulness..."

That this truth about God comes in the midst of the Book of Lamentations is both a comfort and a challenge. It's comforting to know that trusting in God's unstoppable compassion and faithfulness is well placed trust. It's good to know that this kind of trust was never designed to make grief and lament illegitimate realities, but to put them in a context of hope. It's a comfort to know that God's compassion and faithfulness are not finite things that might someday run out or get used up. They are infinite attributes of our eternal Lord.

The challenge is: Do we live, really *live*, as if this is true: His compassion and faithfulness are unlimited and dependable. Or, do we create back-up plans and worry over them, protect them and justify them? Do we limit God to what we feel is reasonable and end up living by mostly reason, and not by faith?

Several months ago I bought a new pair of work gloves. The old ones had finally worn through in enough places that they were useless to protect my hands from splinters and abrasions, but they sure were comfortable and familiar. The new gloves sat in the back seat of my truck for weeks after I bought them. Somehow I didn't want to mess them up, or start the process of using them up. They have a finite useful life, and I didn't want to start that clock ticking just yet. Silly, huh? I bought them to protect my hands from damage, but they sat unused. Eventually I got a big enough splinter of hemlock lodged in my palm to not only use the new gloves, but to actually throw the old ones away. I had made a commitment.

It struck me later that if I actually had an unlimited supply of work gloves (new ones every morning) it might just change the way I work with my hands. Instead of cautiously protecting my new gloves from harm, I could throw myself into my work with more abandon. If I trusted that conserving (hoarding) my gloves was unnecessary, I might just work with more joy.

Where do you and I tend to place the truth of His compassion and faithfulness: on the back seat of our lives or in the palm of our hands? If we really knew that all His loving attributes were *new every morning*, could we walk out our days with more generosity of spirit?

As the new year begins, I'm challenged by this verse to risk treating His compassion and faithfulness as the inexhaustible resources for life that they are. I wish I could go so far as to say it's a resolution, but maybe a risk is a good enough start. I look forward to seeing where the Infinite and Unstoppable One takes us this year.

Second Hour for Pre-K through 6th Grade

As Christians the most important book we own is the Bible. The Bible is an all time best seller. How much do we read/study our Bible? How easy do you find it to use and understand? Pear Churchmouse Carie Good

Dear Churchmouse,

I consider myself a good Christian; I try to be kind and generous and thoughtful. I don't have any vices like smoking or drinking. I really can't think of anything that I do that is mean or hurtful. In fact, when I try to confess my sins during my evening prayer, I often can't think of anything. So, how does Christian repentance apply to me?

Dear Saint,

No one knows what sin is until he is born again. The evidence that I am delivered from sin is that I know the real nature of sin in me. This is not conscious sin only, but the tremendously profound understanding of sin, which only the Holy Spirit in me realizes.

Sin is a fundamental *relationship*; it is not immorality, but the temperament of self-realization. It is not wrong doing, it is wrong *being* – independence from God. This disposition may work itself out in decorous morality –- or in immorality – either way it has the same basis, my claim to my right to myself. Our Lord did not pay any attention to the moral degradation of one person or the moral attainment of another; He looked at something we do not see; the disposition.

When a man really sees himself as the Lord sees him, it is not the sins of the flesh that shock him, but the awful nature of the pride of his own heart against Jesus Christ. When he sees himself in the light of the Lord, the shame and the horror and the desperate conviction come home. What our Lord wants us to present to him is not goodness, not honesty, nor endeavor, but real solid sin; that is all He can take from us. And what does He give in exchange for our sin? Real solid righteousness; His own righteousness. But we must relinquish all pretence of being anything, all claim of meriting God's consideration.

Sin is a thing I am born with, and I cannot make it go away. If you refuse to agree with the fact that there is self-seeking, instead of reconciling yourself to it, you will compromise with it. We do not like to reconcile ourselves to the fact of sin. We take a rational view of life and say that a person by controlling his instincts, and by educating himself, can produce a life that will slowly evolve into the life of God. But as we go

on, we find the presence of something that we have not taken into consideration; which is sin itself. We have to recognize that sin is a fact, not a defect; sin is mutiny against God. Either God or sin must die in my life.

Am I prepared to let the Spirit of God search me until I know what the disposition of sin is – the thing that resists the very Spirit of God in me? Then, if so, will I agree with God's verdict on the disposition of sin – that it should be identified with the death of Jesus? I cannot reckon myself "dead unto sin" unless I have been through this radical issue of my will before God. If the Spirit of God has given you a vision of what you are apart from the grace of God (and He only does this when His Spirit is at work) you know there is no criminal who is half so bad in actuality as you know yourself to be in possibility. [As Paul said, "I know that in me dwells no good thing."]

Conviction of sin always brings a fearful binding sense of the law. I, a guilty sinner, can never get right with God; it is impossible. There is only one way in which I can get right with God, and that is by the Death of Jesus Christ. God alone removes my sin in redemption. I must get rid of the lurking idea that I can ever be right with God because of my obedience - which of us could ever obey God to absolute perfection! Get alone with Jesus and either tell Him that you do not want sin to die out in you; or else tell Him that at all costs you want His death to be realized in you. As soon as you transact in confident faith what our Lord did on the Cross, you will know with a supernatural knowledge that your "old self" is crucified with Christ, and nevertheless, "you live", because you are also resurrected with Christ.
