



Pictures of Heaven




When I suggested drawing a picture of what heaven might look like, my Sunday School class enthusiastically and joyfully drew the following pictures. Jan Collins

"Tearing down the old, to build anew"

This was the spur of the moment summary I came up with in response to someone's question "What was Randy's Sabbatical Journey about?"

Beginning his sabbatical in June, one goal was clear: to tear out the existing structure - beams, boards, walls, floors and windows - of the 200 year-old barn portion of our house, and replace the insufficient carrying timbers with sound and solid beams; add adequate insulation; hand-plane and finish the boards; install new, tight energy-efficient windows. This is a major project that has been in line for Randy's attention for over a decade; and the sort of thing that, for him, is creative, enjoyable, challenging, rewarding and rejuvenating. It fit the bill for an unhurried block of time where his sabbatical assignment was to immerse himself in something refreshing. Randy also finds that working with his hands is meditative and prayerful work, and the Lord often ministers to his spirit during such a task.

Almost any remodeling project requires some dismantling in the early stages. Things may look like a mess for quite awhile before recognizable progress begins to take shape. This was certainly the case in our room, as we shoved all the furniture into the middle of the room, covered it all with plastic, and Randy began to remove the heavy, cracked ceiling beams and all the old boards. Rat-infested remains of old insulation saw the light of day. Ancient dust was everywhere. The heavy woodstove was moved and a new flue hacked into the brick and mortar; and soon a big saw was set up in the midst of everything. We got used to stepping over boxes of screws and hand tools; and sweeping up scrap, wood shavings and sawdust each evening.

When the Holy Spirit is involved in a person's life, for divine healing and redemption, often an old "lie" or misconception that forms the basis of relationship with self, others and the world must be exposed and dismantled before the truth of scripture can form a fresh framework, to set that person free. Free to rebuild a new view of self and others, based on a Biblical understanding of relationship founded on Jesus' love.

This brings to mind many stories in the Bible, where individuals went through a process of dismantling a comfortable, false, world-view, which had been taken for granted, in order to grasp a truer, deeper understanding. I think of Joseph, who was imprisoned before he was made ruler; of Moses,

who was exiled from Egypt before he returned to lead his people; of Saul, who was blinded before he saw the light; of Peter, who denied Jesus before he was empowered to testify with boldness. Even Jesus said, "Whoever wishes to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will find it" (Matthew 16:25).

As Randy's work pace took on a joyful rhythm, other cares and responsibilities fell away and the Lord had unencumbered access to his heart. Day after day his hands were busy, his mind focused, but his heart was engaged in worship and listening to the Lord. The Master Carpenter was also at work, slowly removing some old walls of self-protection and dismantling faulty beliefs of pressured performance that had served a lifetime as an attempt to insulate Randy from the tender scars of his painful childhood.

It was while spending a few days on Lake Michigan in early October, walking alone along the misty shores one early morning, that Jesus nailed a fresh-cut timber into place in Randy's soul, plumb and true. The first plank of a sturdy new framework for ministry and relationship. As concrete as the mortar holding our new hearth in place, Randy saw His Father's heart; accepting, approving, receiving. Randy knew without doubt that he was IN the Beloved, secure and eternal, and there was no longer a place for needing to prove himself special. A life long burden, based on a lie, was lifted.

Our room project isn't completed, as we knew it wouldn't be, before Randy returned to work this week. Neither, of course, is the remodeling of our souls, until we are made fit for eternity. As we attend to the One who formed us, He continues to be at work in us, perfecting us for His purposes. Often this involves tearing down those thoughts that would exalt themselves against the knowledge of Christ, and replacing them with the truth that sets us free; but Jesus does this ever so gently, in the quiet of our souls, as we yield to the skillful hands of the Master.

Randy's sabbatical was deeply refreshing for both of us. Our room is still under construction, but we have passed the turning point. The old is gone. The new is coming. Randy is also walking in a peaceable newness of soul, rejoicing and expecting the reconstruction to continue, until, as Jesus promised in Philippians 1:6, "He will complete that which He has begun.
