Great Commission

"...the eleven disciples were on their way to Galilee, headed for the mountain Jesus had set for their reunion. The moment they saw him, they worshiped him. Some, though, held back, not sure about worship, about risking themselves totally. Jesus, undeterred, went right ahead and gave his charge: "God has authorized and commanded me to commission you: Go out and train everyone you meet, far and near, in this way of life, marking them by baptism in the threefold name: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Then instruct them in the practice of all I have commanded you. I'll be with you as you do this, day after day after day, right up to the end of the age." (Matthew 28:16-20, from The Message)

Earlier in Matthew's gospel, Jesus is recorded as summing up "the practice of all I have commanded you" as being: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind, . . . and Love you neighbor as yourself." (Matt.22:37-39) This passage is often referred to as "The great Commandment," and the Matt. 28 passage (above) as "The great Commission."

Loving God and loving our neighbor are at the core of everything we are called to do - and be - as believers in Jesus Christ. Last Sunday, as Laura and Seth shared about their summer experiences in word and deed of "Going out and instructing everyone in all I have commanded", some of us may have felt the twinge of a shortfall in obedience to the great commandment (Love), as well as to the great commission (Go).

Let's say some of us are aware of "something missing" in our love for our neighbor. We're glad it seems to be someone else's call. Maybe we aren't sure what to do in the face of such massive need all around us. Perhaps when we hear of someone we know going to serve in a soup kitchen for the homeless in inner-city Miami in July (like Laura did), we feel both glad that some neighborloving happened, and a bit sheepish ourselves. Some of us have a hard time picturing ourselves in that setting. And yet, the command remains with no escape clause. What to do?

First, let's take guilt and pressure off the table as remedies for this dilemma. A good scolding about our lack of love for our neighbor will never produce good fruit; on the contrary, guilt-driven ministry subtly obliges the recipients to respond to *us* in some way, and can even be harmful to them. Perhaps, because loving God and loving our neighbor are so inseparable (in Jesus' view), we could simply and humbly acknowledge our discomfort with "neighbor loving" and throw ourselves fully into loving God. An interesting thing may happen: The more we freely worship God with all our heart and soul and mind, the more we are freed to love our neighbor as ourselves. We start noticing people with needs (of all sorts) around us. Without so much as a second thought, we find ourselves moved to risk loving them. When our heart and soul and mind are worshiping God, crippling self-consciousness loses its power. So, feeling a lack in loving your neighbor? Deepen your worship of God.

Others of us are pretty comfortable and gifted at loving our neighbor, but when it comes to loving God (worship), we feel ourselves withdraw somehow. We are much more drawn to fixing practical needs than offering all of our selves in worship and sharing with others the unseen aspects of God's love and grace. The thought of proclaiming the good news of salvation through Jesus' sacrifice for us, and inviting others to respond to his love (like Seth did in Costa Rica), feels awkward and perhaps intrusive. Even in our own experience of private or corporate worship, we feel oddly embarrassed and guarded, not quite sure about "risking ourselves totally." And yet, Jesus' command calls for wholeheartedness in loving God. What to do?

Again, guilt and pressure need to go. Any challenge along the lines of "Come on, worship harder! Love God more!" is the opposite of helpful in releasing wholeheartedness. A dutiful atmosphere like that, whether it's corporately implied or even self-imposed, just increases a sense of 'self', hindering real love and freedom in worship. So, again, because loving God and loving our neighbor are so inseparable (in Jesus' view), we could simply and humbly acknowledge our discomfort with "God loving" and throw

ourselves fully into loving our neighbors. An interesting thing may happen: The more we unselfconsciously love and serve our neighbor in a way that brings glory to God, the more we will see and hear and experience the potency of Jesus' love and grace in the lives of others. If you spend five minutes with someone who is genuinely aware of their helplessness apart from God and who then has tasted His love (through you), don't be surprised if you are gently moved to worship too. We start noticing the presence and greatness and praise-worthiness of God all around us, and we find that the resulting love for Him reduces the power of our fears in worship. So, feeling a lack in your love for God? Find yourself a neighbor in need and love them as yourself.

The promise from our Emmanuel (God with us) remains: "I will be with you always..."


It was a great auction! When all was totaled, it came out to about \$17,700. With our \$3000 match that makes almost \$21k!

Virginia—

The verses I've chosen, without knowing what Abner was choosing, follow a similar theme. I have underlined many verses in the book of Ephesians in my Bible; those that follow are especially meaningful to me as I think of God's saving grace through Christ and its meaning for me and my faith family, in this church and scattered around the world.

"...You are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are citizens with the saints and also members of the household of God, built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Iesus himself as the cornerstone. In him the whole structure is joined together and grows into a holy temple in the Lord; in whom you also are built together spiritually into a dwelling place for God. ...I bow my knees before the Father, from whom every family in heaven and on earth takes its name. I pray that, according to the riches of his glory, he may grant that you may be strengthened in your inner being with power through his Spirit, and that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith, as you are being rooted and grounded in love. I pray that you may have the power to comprehend, with all the saints, what is the breadth and length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, so that you may be filled with all the fullness of God." Eph. 3:19-22 and 4:14-19 (NRSV)

When I think of a favorite Bible verse, the one that most quickly comes to my mind is Evangelium S. Johannis 3:16 taken from Martin Luther's translation:

"Also hat Gott die Welt geliebet, dass er seinen eingebornen Sohn gab, auf dass alle, die an ihn glauben, night verloren werden, sondern das ewige Leben haben."

Yes, I did first learn it in German. However, I appreciate equally the English translation that, although slightly different, has the same meaning:

"For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth on him should not perish, but have everlasting life." (KJV)

I especially like this verse because it emphasizes God's love, which I believe is what grace is all about.

A close second for me is the verse that is generally considered to have been Menno Simons' favorite, I Cor. 3:11:

"For other foundation can no man lay than that is laid, which is Jesus Christ." (KJV) The KJV of course uses "no man" but the meaning is obviously inclusive, and again I site Luther's translation which, incidentally, preceded KJV:

"kann niemand legen" = "can no one lay".


